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Ciao Frank,  
sorry for disturb you, but it's my very first experience with this completely new world of LCIO + MARLIN et al.

First of all, I have installed all the needed (and optional) tools. BTW, I've installed LCIO v01-08 since it was advertised as the latest stable version on ilcsoft web page, but I've the feeling this is not really the latest version. Then as a second step I'm training with the use of LCIO. For that reason I tried to write a very simple code to translate a test MIMOSA V file (with each pixel output written in ASCII row-wise). This test file contains 100 events.

The idea is the following. I created a collection called matrix of LCIO::TRACKERRAWDATA. I push\_backed to this collection a TrackerRawData, one for every pixel in the detector. I added the collection to the event with the name "raw-matrix" and then I wrote the event via the LCWriter. It looks reasonable to me, doesn't it? This is what I did in the converter.cc attached file.

So far, so good. The problem comes when I try to read the file back. Using the dumpEvent tool, I got exactly what I would expect, but one single strangeness.

The "number of elements" is zero. The collection seems to be empty. To cross-check, I tried also to add another collection (of LCIO::SIMCALORIMETERHIT) as you did in the documentation. This is the  
 "// \*\* //" commented part of the converter.cc file. Doing so, what I got from the dumpEvent is the following:

being  $512 \times 512 = 262144$  the number of pixels in the detector.

What's wrong? Could you have a look at the attached code?

For the time being, I'm using a TrackerRawData to describe one single pixel, but probably it is wiser to use TrackerRawData to describe a full detector even if I cannot use any longer the cellID's to specify the pixel coordinates. Those can, anyway, be retrieved from the order the pixel appears into the adcValue STL vector as it actually is in the sucimaPix framework. What do you think about that?

Anyway I will provide a patch as soon as I have a fix for the problem.

Apart from the fact that of course one should be able to store also odd numbers of ADC values and one in particular it is probably not a good idea to do so for the non-zero-suppressed pixelsensor raw data. It simply causes an awfully large overhead. Here I would suggest that you store a full matrix (or parts of it - see next point) in one TrackerRawData object. Otherwise file sizes will be very large and I/O unnecessary slow. I modified the example accordingly.

Strangly the sio-library refused to store more than  $2^{16}$  short values in one call. This of course also needs to be understood and fixed. Anyway for the time being one needs to restrict the pixels per object to 65536.

In the example code I divided the 512X512 sensor into four quarters (note that the code won't work for larger sensors of course!) and encoded the pixel numbers/ranges in the cellid. (please use the attached header file at \$LCIO/src/cpp/include/UTIL/CellIDEncoder.h until we release a proper LCIO patch).

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Dear all,

as promised, I'm trying to write a first attempt of a Marlin processor able to calculate pedestal and estimate noise from a LCIO input file containing pixel detector data.

Since I hope that in some time (see [this thread](#)) we will be able to save a full detector (when I say detector I mean one telescope plane) output in a TrackerRawData structure, I'm basing the processor on the idea that the input LCIO file will contain for each event a collection of TrackerRawData's, one for each detector plane.

In my standard analysis procedure, I do the following:

In a loop over all events (or a user selected subset, say the first 100) I calculate the first approximation to pedestal and noise using the average and the variance of each pixel signal distribution. In this first loop, I usually do not apply neither common mode suppression nor hit rejection algorithms, but I flag very noisy pixel as bad so that they are not considered in the following analysis steps.

The first order correction to the pedestal and noise values is obtained in a second loop on events in this way:

Since we already have an indication about each pixel noise, for each event we can reject hit pixels on a signal to noise ratio base.

For each event the common mode level is calculated and consequently a new pedestal value is calculated.

Again, at the end of the event loop, I flag other too noisy pixels. Usually this second bad pixel masking is much weaker than the first.

The previous point can be reiterated several times depending on the residual common-mode level. Usually not needed.

So my first idea was to create a PedeNoiseProcessor doing the full procedure. But how to convince Marlin to loop at least twice on all events? Is it possible?

The second idea, probably easier and (maybe) more elegant is to write a PedeNoiseProcessor that is just doing point 1. And then write a second processor, say CommonModeSupProcessor that, using some initial pedestal and noise value, produces the second order approximation. In this way, one can decide how many time the common mode sup algo should be applied just adding CommonModeSupProcessor's to the steering file. Do you think is doable?

Now, I have a more general question on how the framework works. Consider a steering file in

which three processors (processorA, processorB and processorC) are active and properly configured. How is Marlin working? It is something like:

Case 1

Hi Antonio et al,

I made a new tag in LCIO: v01-08-01-pre (a prerelease patch version) that fixes the issues that we encountered two days ago:

proper collection names are enforced (need to be valid C/C++ names - no special characters)



except '\_')

there actually was `_no_` bug in the I/O routine for odd numbers of shorts (e.g. one ADC value) this was a very strange side effect with the invalid collection name 'raw-frame'

so in fact the code that you sent me originally runs fine if you change:

(except for the logic of reading the data and creating events - one additional event is created)

as mentioned previously, of course one should not use TrackerRawData to store single pixels if non-zero-suppressed for performance reasons

a bug in the I/O routine of SIO that limited the number of shorts to 65k has been fixed - now there is no more limit in the number of ADC values that can be stored in a TrackerRawData object

-> a full sensor data matrix can be stored in one object (no need to split into subquadrants or the like)

CellIDEncoder has been fixed to work with Tracker(Raw)Data and TRackerPulse - also `dumpevent` will print the cellid words if the CellIDEncoder has been used for encoding (or a proper decoding string has been written manually)

-> note that there is no need to store x and y pixel ranges any more, however you might want use this feature to make object sizes smaller sth. the group should decide on

I tested the code under SL3, SL4 and OSX 10.4 (intel) but of course it should also run under other common linux distros

Let me know of any further issues or questions that come up.

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Hi Antonio,

the event loop in Marlin right now is really strictly linear, i.e. every event (up to maxRecord) is presented to every processor in the order they are defined in the steering file - similar to what you call 'case 1'. This is the natural choice for normal reconstruction/analysis where you add additional information to the event with every processor.

By using conditions in the execute section one can influence the program flow, e.g. only call certain part of reconstruction or analysis if certain pre-conditions are fulfilled. One can also of course have different sets of processors for different events, e.g. calibration and reconstruction. But in principle every event will be processed exactly once by one 'path' of processors.

If your calibration will run on the full data sample of the job you can of course specify the set of input files twice and use a flag (`isCalibration=true`) for the first set and a flag (`isCalibration=false`) for the second set and so achieve what you want.

However if you want to run a calibration typically on the first N events and then process the full, larger set with these constants one needs to 'rewind' the data set when the calibration is finished and then start from the beginning for the rest of the processing.

I have written some experimental code that would allow to do so.

Please check out cvs tag `fg20070202-rewind` and look at `$MARLIN/src/Testprocessor.cc`.

When using the attached steering file the processor loops three times over the first three events for 'calibration' and then the rest (in this case only output processor) is called for all events. If this works for your case of pedestal calibration we could make a release of this 'feature' soon.

It might be useful also for other groups that want to do 'injob calibration'

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Dear Frank, thanks for your reply.

I like this idea of rewind the event loop and I believe it is going to be helpful also in many other cases, for example for the eta function generation as presented by Auguste. I will try as soon as possible to modify my `PedeAndNoiseProcessor` in order to use this feature.

Now the question is the following: usually one has a specific pedestal run (where in principle no particles are hitting the telescope). This run may be used by several other "real" runs as a starting point for pedestal and noise. So the typical idea is to

calculate pede and noise at the beginning,  
save it into a separate file and  
re-use it whenever you need.

To do that, we can imagine to have a steering file that exploiting the rewind feature is looping as many time as needed on the input data to produce the pedestal file that it is actually containing one event only with a `TrackerData` for pedestal and one for the noise. Then a second steering file in which a `ApplyPedestalCorrectionProcessor` is loading from the pedestal file the needed calibration info and apply the correction on a event base. This requires a processor handling I/O operation from a different file. Do you believe is it possible?

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Dear all,

I'm trying to figure out which are the specific parameters we would like to save within the LCIO RunHeader.

The LCIO data model allows the user to add "named" parameters of integer, float and string type to the run header, the event and to each collection. The basic underlying idea is to store parameters into a map and use the name key to retrieve them.

Without breaking any LCIO rules, I've prepared a class EUTelRunHeaderImpl with no data members but with methods to get/set our specific parameters into the run header. For example, instead of writing:

```
runHeader->setValue("DAQSWVERSION",1.0293);  
float softVersion = runHeader->getFloatVal("DAQSWVERSION");
```

one can use

```
runHeader->setDAQSWVersion(1.0293);  
float softVersion = runHeader->getDAQSWVersion();
```

This may be very useful when the number of parameters grows up and we have always to remember the correct parameter name to set/get it. I believe that this is especially true for people involved in the DAQ software. If you don't agree, you can also not use it !!!

Now, here comes a list of parameters I've already implemented for the run header:

RunHeaderVersion (float)  
DateTime (string) a time stamp in human readable format  
DataType (string) a flag to indentify real DAQ data or simulated or converted...

DAQHWVersion (float) It represents the version of the hardware part of the DAQ.  
DAQHWName (string) It is the name of the DAQ HW system. In principle we can have many!

DAQSWVersion (float)

DAQSWName (string) as above but now for the software part of the DAQ

SimulSWVersion (float)

SimulSWName (string) as for the DAQ but here for the simulation software used for data generation

GeoID (int) an identification number to identify the run geometry within the geometry database

NoOfDetector (int) this is the number of detectors in the current run. It is redundant since this information is also stored within the geometry db, but at least for on-line monitoring I believe that access to an external database shouldn't be compulsory. This number may also not corresponds to the number of planes.

MinX, MaxX, MinY, MaxY (vector<int>). To properly store data into a Tracker(Raw)Data object we have to use the CellIDEncoder. This requires to know the first and the last pixel of each sensors along both directions. MinX/Y may be different from zero, when there are multiple sensors in a plane, or when we consider a detector one channel (as in Mimostar2).

Should we add some standard field about the DUT? Adding other parameters is always possible.

Please comment this list and add what is (for sure) missing!

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Dear Frank and other,

I tried the Rewind feature you added and I believe we are very close to the solution. The point is the following, your example is perfectly working when I want to re-loop on a subset of events. This may happen but, at least for pedestal, it is also very common to loop over one full file. I browsed your modifications especially in the Marlin.cc file and I discovered that Rewind exceptions are caught only from the processEvent(LCEvent \*) and not from end(). Do you think it is possible to add a try/catch block also there?

This will be perfect in both cases, if one wants to calculate pedestal just on a certain event range then for all other events the processEvent(LCEvent\*) method is returning immediately and the rewind (if needed) is done in the end() method.

If this is not possible, then I would like to know how many events are saved into the file. So that in the processEvent(LCEvent\*) I can add a isLastEvent() block. Is this information available somewhere?

Another question, again related with the end() and/or isLastEvent(). The main outputs of the PedestalNoiseProcessor are just three vectors: one for pedestal, one for noise and the last one for the pixel status. These three vectors are continuously updated during the processing, but their final value is available only at the end of the last loop, so in the end() method. The original idea was to save in the output LCIO file just a collection with three TrackerData objects (a single collection in a single event). The point is that the end() method doesn't have access anymore to the LCEvent. I should do it in the processEvent(LCEvent\*) but only for the last event.

Another possibility is to store the three vectors into a "Condition" file, but I still have to better investigate this opportunity.

What do you think about?

Hi Antonio,

I am glad that the 'rewind feature' works for the pedestal calibration, at least for the best part of it. As pointed out this is somewhat experimental software that I quickly implemented. For a release I would like to iterate on the design and understand the implications and use cases better. For example I think an additional callback 'calibrateEvent(LCEvent\* evt)' would make the usage a lot simpler and clearer.

Putting the rewind feature also to the end() method would cause potentially severe problems with resource allocation. The modular design of Marlin provides the init() and end() callbacks to the processors for resource allocation and it is guaranteed that both methods are called exactly once before and after the processing of events respectively.

Also there is currently no way to tell how many events are going to be in the input data stream that is going to be processed (other than reading all event headers in the stream).

I think both things are not really needed for a calibration. One should have a well defined criterion to end the calibration loop and rewind, e.g. the first N events or until all errors of constants are below a certain level.

However if you really want to run the calibration on all events you can easily do this right now by simply specifying the input stream twice and toggling the calibration flag if the first event is presented for the second time.

If you want to make your calibration persistent I would suggest to use LCCD the conditions data toolkit. With this you can for example store the calibration in a plain LCIO file and then easily access the calibration in a Marlin job that processes the events.

LCCD has various options on how the conditions (calibration) data are stored/read: database, plain LCIO file, LCIO file with DB dump or in the Data file directly. Please check the documentation and examples.

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Dear All!

This short post to announce that we are very close to the first release of the EU Telescope Marlin processors. The code comes with doxygen documentation, but since we still don't have a place to publish it, I will try to describe here what has been already implemented and what is still missing. For the time being I tried to avoid ROOT linkage and I'm using AIDA for histogramming.

This is what we already have:

**EUTelSucimalmagerReader.** This is just a test to implement the on-line conversion of the standard SUCIMA DAQ format. Marlin reads an event in the SUCIMA DAQ format and converts it on the fly into a LCEvent. In principle we can implement a reader also for the IRES USB Imager board.

**EUTelPedestalNoiseProcessor.** This processor calculates the pedestal and the noise value of each pixel of each detector in the telescope. Few algorithm have been implemented and waiting to be fully debugged. The results of this processor are saved into a "Condition" file (it can also be a database entry, but not sure it is really needed).

**EUTelCalibrateEventProcessor.** This processor removes the pedestal from the current rawdata and eventually suppress the common mode. The output of this processor is a collection of TrackerData object, one per detector, with the data ready for the cluster search.

**EUTelClusteringProcessor.** This processor looks into each detector TrackerData for group of pixels passing the cluster selection cuts. The output of this processor is a collection of TrackerData containing only the clusters.

What is missing:

**EUTelAutoPedestalProcessor.** This processor will be used with self-biased pixel detectors in which there is actually no need for a real pedestal calculation. The pedestal and noise values for each pixel can be initialize to a reasonable value and then, during the first N events updates to the correct value.

**EUTelClusterMergingProcessor.** This processor will calculate the distance between clusters belonging to the same detector. In the case the two clusters are touching each other, something should be done to separate them. Probably not really needed in a telescope setup where the number of clusters per plain should be sufficiently low.

**EUTelDataQualityMonitor.** This processor should take as input the clusters provided by the EUTelClusteringProcessor and fill in sets of histograms/profiles/distributions... to cross-check the data quality at the detector level. Typical examples are the SNR for each detector, the beam

profile, the eta function...

All the remaining track finding / fitting stuff.

Interfacing to the geometry database.

You can download the source code from here or via anonymous CVS. Once you have the source code, uncompress it into \$(MARLIN)/packages and type make from the Marlin top folder.

Type make doc to produce the documentation.

To produce some example files browse to the \$(MARLIN)/packages/Eutelescope/test and read the README files.

Please give it a try and let me know what you think about. Your feedback is very well appreciated!

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I have another idea of a possible way to handle this. In the Bonn/Mannheim DAQ, they have a beginning-of-run-event (BORE) and an end-of-run-event (EORE) that were sent before the first and after the last real events in a run. They were basically a way for the individual producers to send header/trailer information to the DAQ.

I like the idea of this, and I am going to implement something similar in the final DAQ. These events don't have to be saved to the LCIO output file, but if they are, then the EORE could be used to detect the end of a run, before reaching the end of the file, and without needing to put the number of events in the header.

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Dear all,

during the last meeting in Geneva we concluded that we need something like a BORE/EORE identification. In case the acquisition software was hanging we need to have a sort of "file fix" utility able to scan the LCIO file and eventually append an EORE in the end.

I prepared this utility as a Marlin processor (see details below).

Another important use of this utility is more related to the analysis itself (this is actually the reason why I prepared it ).

The point is the following: since Marlin is "Modular" and we are preparing separate processors for each task, one can imagine to perform the analysis step by step keeping track of all the intermediate output files. Consequently every intermediate files should have the same structure (say with an EORE at the end). This is trivial whenever all records within the input file are processed, but if the user limits the number of record to something below the total number, then the output file won't have the EORE.

In Marlin framework, a workaround can be easily applied implementing an EUTelOutputProcessor inheriting from the standard LCIOOutputProcessor. When the EUTelOutputProcessor::end() is called by the ProcessorMgr, a check on the type of the previous event is done. If this is an EORE then just close the file, if not append an EORE before closing.

From an OO point of view, this just requires to re-implement the end() method keeping all the others as in LCIOOutputProcessor. It is very easy and I've done it already.

From a technical point of view, there a small detail to be fixed in a the original LCIOOutputProcessor implementation. Since I want to derive EUTelOutputProcessor from LCIOOutputProcessor and not from Processor directly, I (think I) need to have also the LCIOOutputProcessor(const std::string& typeName) constructor as it is in the DataSourceProcessor.

This modification along with another change to make the new messaging system working also with const method is included in the attached patch. Frank, can you comment on that? Do you think it is worth or we are moving in the wrong direction?
